FIRST COMMUNION FAQ

MASS ATTENDANCE IS NOW REQUIRED. WHAT DOES THAT MEAN EXACTLY?

For students in Sacramental prep years (1st, 2nd, 8th, and 9th), attendance of Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation is now required. It is necessary to fulfill this requirement in order to receive the Sacraments of First Communion and Confirmation. If this requirement is not fulfilled, the reception of these Sacraments will be delayed.

CAN MY CHILD ONLY OCCASIONALLY ATTEND SUNDAY MASS & STILL RECEIVE FIRST COMMUNION?

Weekly Sunday Mass attendance is now *required* for reception of First Communion. It is understandable to miss very occasionally due to sickness or severe weather, but a pattern of missed Masses will not be excused, and will delay the reception of the Sacrament.

WHAT IF WE ATTEND A DIFFERENT CHURCH FOR MASS?

If you attend a different parish for Mass, the card must still be filled out with your child's name and the date, and be signed by the priest who celebrated the Mass at that parish. The card can then be brought to school the next Monday, or CCD class the next Wednesday. OR a bulletin from that parish can also be brought back as well, as long as the child's name and grade is written on the bulletin, and it is signed by the priest there.

WHEN WILL MASS ATTENDANCE BEGIN BEING RECORDED?

In order to allow time to adjust to this new system, we will begin keeping track of the Mass cards on September 9th.

DOES SATURDAY NIGHT MASS COUNT? OR DOES IT HAVE TO BE SUNDAY?

Yes - Saturday evening vigil Masses fulfill the Sunday Mass requirement.

WHAT IF I'M NOT CATHOLIC?

If you are not Catholic, we still welcome you to join us for Sunday Mass! However, you are never required to attend Mass for any reason.

WHY IS ATTENDING SUNDAY MASS NECESSARY?

The observance of "keeping holy the Lord's Day" goes all the way back to Genesis, when God created the world and then rested on the 7th day. The Sabbath -- Sunday -- is a gift from God to us; it is an invitation to rest and be rejuvenated, to look forward to Heaven and to rejoice in the Resurrection. The Catechism states, "The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice" (CCC 2181). As such, all Catholics are required to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation: this is the First Precept of the Catholic Church, and one of the "indispensable minimum" requirements for practicing Catholics (2041). Furthermore, "Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin" (2181).

DOES THE FRIDAY SCHOOL MASS COUNT IF WE CAN'T MAKE IT ON SUNDAYS?

No, although we encourage Mass attendance throughout the week, the only one that will fulfill this requirement is the Sunday (or Saturday evening vigil) Mass.

SO THERE WON'T BE ONE BIG FIRST COMMUNION DAY THIS YEAR?

Correct. Each child will receive his or her First Communion on a date determined between the individual, Fr. Kyle, and the Director of Evangelization. The child will not receive the Sacrament until he/she is deemed ready. This will be determined based on an interview with Fr. Kyle and/or the Director of Evangelization, and/or a report from the teacher.

DO WE HAVE TO ATTEND CCD IF WE EDUCATE AT HOME OR GO TO THE SCHOOL?

CCD is a requirement for reception of the Sacrament of Confirmation, regardless of where the child attends school. It is also required by the Diocese that individuals preparing for First Communion must be in formation for two years prior to the reception of that sacrament - thus, typically through 1st and 2nd grade. If the child attends St. Francis Xavier school, this requirement is fulfilled. However, if the child is educated at home, the fulfillment of this requirement will be assessed on a case-by-case basis. Please contact the Director of Evangelization for more details if you educate your children at home. For non-sacramental prep years, CCD is never required for anyone.
